Subject: Seeking the Administration's Position on Removing an Anti-Busing Provision

Hi Mo,

I hope this email finds you well and apologies for a late email in advance of a three day weekend. We know that access to racially, socioeconomically, and linguistically diverse learning environments, is a big priority for the Biden-Harris Administration. It is evident in <u>the Secretary's priorities</u>; <u>the FY 23</u> <u>budget</u>, including investments in the Fostering Diverse Schools Program and Magnet School Assistance Program; <u>through grant notices</u>; and <u>commitments</u> during <u>the campaign</u>.

We are reaching out to today because there is <u>a barrier in federal law</u> that would help prevent federal funds from being used to support transportation for school integration. Prior prohibitions on using federal funding on transportation to support school integration have been removed on a bipartisan basis through the appropriations process (see page 15, #3; for more background).

I am reaching out to today because the Hill is working through the FY 23 appropriations process and may reach out to see if the Administration supports removing Section 1652 which prohibits – with

some hurdle-ridden exceptions – the use of federal funding for transportation to support school integration. Given the Administration's work on this front and the President's specific commitments to remove these busing prohibitions, I am assuming that the answer is yes, the Administration's position is that it supports repealing Section 1652. If that is the case, it would be great if you could share that with the House and Senate education authorizers and appropriators.

It was assumed, in 2020, when Congress repealed Section 426 of the General Education Provisions Act (GEPA), that the last of these prohibitions had been removed. With Section 1652 still on the books, which also applies to programs that GEPA governs, that is not the case, and the language is quite chilling, as it requires, "the express written voluntary consent of appropriate local school officials," in order for federal funds to be used to support transportation for school integration.

It also provides multiple footholds for anti-diversity forces to prevent federal funds from being used to support transportation for school integration (see this language: "No such funds shall be made available for transportation when the time or distance of travel is so great as to risk the health of the children or significantly impinge on the educational process of such children, or where the educational opportunities available at the school to which it is proposed that any such student be transported will be substantially inferior to those opportunities offered at the school to which such student would otherwise be assigned under a nondiscriminatory system of school assignments based on geographic zones established without discrimination on account of race, religion, color, or national origin.").

Finally, the FY 22 omnibus bill required ED to provide T.A. to districts on how federal ESEA school improvement funds can be used to support transportation for school integration (page 260). The presence of 1652 will make this T.A. less straightforward, and again, possibly chilling for districts.

In short, I hope the Administration's official position is the repeal of 1652 and that it can be communicated to the Hill in a timely fashion so it can be repealed via the FY23 funding bill. Removing this provision is important for state and local communities that are voluntarily and locally acting to diversify their schools, including through transportation that facilities inter- and intra-district efforts.

Thanks again for meeting with us last week. I wanted to circle back on one item that we forgot to include in our follow up that pertains to funding the Fostering Diverse Schools Program in the FY23 bill. Attached, please find a memo that outlines K-12 programs that have been authorized on appropriations bill or have been proposed to be authorized on appropriations bill. Specifically, the memo list K-12 programs that the Senate L-HHS majority under Chair Murray have proposed to authorize in their FY22 and FY23 L-HHS bills. Below that is a list of K-12 programs that have been created through the authorization process.

Given the evidence of past action on creating K-12 programs via appropriations, we ask that the

Administration weigh in directly with Senator Murrays staff to communicate that providing \$100 million for the Fostering Diverse Schools program in FY 23 is a priority for the Administration.

Thanks for meeting with LPI, NCSD, and PRRAC yesterday. I wanted to follow up on a few items we discussed and I know PRRAC and NCSD will be following up as well.

First, attached in case it is helpful, is our memo on recommendations for implementing the Title IV-A set-aside to support school diversity as directed by the FY22 omnibus. Many of the researchbased practices to support school diversity may be helpful for the resource document you are putting together on supporting access to diverse school environments.

Second, attached please find the letter Senator Murphy, along with Senators Sanders, Booker, and Durbin, sent to Senator Murray, requesting that the Senate L-HHS fund the \$100 million Fostering Diverse Schools Program in the FY23 bill. Senator Murphy is planning another letter, which will likely be signed by more Senators, that will be sent in late September/ early October. Senator Booker has dropped a note to Senator Murray on this program and Senator Murphy has talked to her on the Senate floor, and will again. Please also <u>find NCSD's FY23 appropriations letter</u>, signed by over 40 groups, which includes an ask to fund the Fostering Diverse Schools program. We hope these resources are helpful as you engage with Congress.
